### Graeae announces writers on the fifth year of the Write to Play programme, in partnership with the Bush Theatre, Soho Theatre, Ovalhouse, Talawa and Tamasha.

*Write to Play* is a bold new writing initiative committed to developing the skills and experience of D/deaf and disabled writers. Over the course of one year, five writers will each write and develop a full-length play through collaboration with some of the most creative minds in the industry.

In summer 2017, Graeae announced that year five of the programme would focus on D/deaf and/or disabled writers from across the UK identifying as BAME, and would be run in partnership with five of the most exciting companies and theatres championing diverse programming; Bush Theatre, Soho Theatre, Ovalhouse, Talawa and Tamasha.

The first four years of *Write to Play* have developed twenty playwrights, many of whom have gone on to have work produced professionally. In August 2017, Graeae and the Royal Exchange Theatre produced for the first time a full length play from a Write to Play graduate. *Cosmic Scallies* by Jackie Hagan (from year 2 of the programme) premiered at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2017, followed by a run at the Royal Exchange Theatre, Manchester. Both runs played to sell-out houses, 4-star reviews and audience acclaim.

The year-long *Write to Play* programme includes Playwriting 101 (an intensive craftfocussed playwriting course), specialist workshops, mentoring sessions and opportunities to have short pieces of work performed in front of an audience. This will not only provide the writers with the opportunity to develop their skills, it will also introduce a new generation of D/deaf and disabled playwrights to the wider theatre landscape.

Graeae and its partners are thrilled to announce that the writers selected for the fifth year of the *Write to Play* programme are: Leanna Benjamin, Kathryn Golding, Shahid Iqbal Khan, Charlotte Maxwell and Lettie Precious.

The *Write to Play* programme (incorporating *Play Labs* and *Play Chats*) is funded by the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation, Arts Council England and Backstage Trust.

**Graeae** is a force of change in world-class theatre - breaking down barriers, challenging preconceptions and boldly placing Deaf and disabled artists centre stage. Artistically led by Jenny Sealey, Graeae's signature characteristic is the compelling creative integration of sign language and audio description, which engages brilliantly with both disabled and non-disabled audiences. Championing accessibility and providing a platform for new generations of artists, Graeae leads the way in pioneering, trail-blazing theatre. **Tamasha** is a diverse cohort of bold theatremakers producing and touring the best new plays and placing the voices of emerging and established artists from culturally diverse backgrounds centre-stage.
