Following over a year of solely online activity due to the pandemic, this autumn and winter sees the return to the live stage of the UK's leading disabled led theatre company **Graeae**. Working in association with some of the most acclaimed producing venues across the country, the company presents two premieres created by writers who have emerged through their **Write a Play Programme**, a flagship writer development initiative that sets out to cultivate and champion Deaf and disabled playwrights nationwide.

10 Nights, which was postponed because of the first lockdown in 2020, will run at **Bush Theatre from** 7 October – 6 November. It is written by **Shahid Iqbal Khan**, whose theatre credits include *The Smile of Despair* - Attenborough Arts Centre, *Stardust* - Belgrade Theatre and *Never Been Away* - 2020: Collection - Tara Theatre and directed by **Kash Arshad** (*Guards at the Taj* - Theatre by the Lake, *Airplays* - Leeds Playhouse).

The work tells the story of Yasser a young Muslim man who decides to take part in itikaf, sleeping and fasting in the mosque for the last ten nights of Ramadan, only to regret his decision soon after he begins. But as he navigates smug worshippers, shared bathrooms, and recurring thoughts of chunky chips, Yasser's isolation forces him to confront a side of himself he's been trying to keep hidden. This moving and funny new play is the story of one man's journey of self-discovery and facing the consequences of one's own actions.

10 Nights is a co-production between Graeae and **Tamasha** in association with **Bush Theatre**. **Press night is 11 October.**

Kerbs is the first major production by Wolverhampton based playwright and poet Michael Southan. Directed by Graeae Associate Director Nickie Miles-Wildin (*Cuttin' It, Crips without Constraints*), it runs from Saturday 26 February to Saturday 5 March 2022 at Belgrade Theatre Coventry.

Exploring taboos around sex, romance and disability the play charts the relationship between Lucy and David who are dating and desperate to find some time alone. The perfect spot? A caravan holiday park, of course. But can this romantic weekend away go to plan? With everything stacked against them including broken toilets, patronising staff and Lucy's constantly interfering mum, not to mention broken pink wafers, this holiday could be make or break.

Kerbs is a co-production between Graeae and Belgrade Theatre Coventry for Coventry City of Culture. Press night is 1 March 2022.

Both 10 Nights and Kerbs will feature Graeae's signature integrated creative captioning and audio description at every show.

Jenny Sealey Artistic Director of Graeae says -

"Our industry has - and still continues to - weather the economic political and social impact of the pandemic. We are cautiously moving towards real life theatre and are so happy and proud to be announcing two very different plays 10 Nights by Shahid Iqbal Khan and Kerbs by Michael Southan. About Belgrade Theatre

The Belgrade is Coventry's largest professional theatre, producing and presenting a diverse range of shows, events and ground-breaking community and education initiatives. In its landmark building, across the region, the UK and online, it uses theatre to entertain, inspire, share the city's stories, uncover hidden histories, and unleash the creativity of diverse communities.

After a year of partial closure due to the pandemic, Belgrade reopened to a socially distanced public on Monday 17 May, determined to be open as much as possible during City of Culture, launching an eclectic mix of music, theatre and comedy over the summer months, with an Autumn Season of non-socially distanced show announced in June.

A key partner of **Coventry UK City of Culture 2021**, the Belgrade Theatre's 2021 programme is being led by three artists from diverse backgrounds, under the role of Co-Artistic Directors, alongside members of the local community. Corey Campbell, Balisha Karra and Justine Themen are developing a new vision and way of working for a 21st Century Theatre, bringing with them a unique perspective that celebrates Coventry's diversity and drives positive change. **The KEYS project** aims to achieve a strategic shift to embed diversity, community collaboration and talent development at the heart of the theatre process.

About Belgrade City of Culture Programme

The Belgrade's City of Culture programme includes a festival of new writing in a co-production with Paines Plough in Paines Plough's Roundabout, the world's first plug-in, pop-up and play theatre, with four new plays performed in repertory from July to August. As part of UK Asian Film Festival (Thurs 27 - Sat 29 May 2021) the Belgrade Theatre hosted five film premieres, socially distanced in their B2 auditorium. It also included a brand-new digital version of Like There's No Tomorrow (Weds 19 May - Sunday 13 June 2021), a National Theatre Connections play first created in 2020 that gives voice to young people's climate concerns, presented by Belgrade Youth Theatre, Filming has now wrapped on SeaView, an original digital series developed by Strictly Arts Theatre Company and Belgrade Film and Digital Ltd using theatre techniques, conceived before Covid-19 took the world of theatre online, and directed by Corey Campbell. Inspired by a true story, and lived experiences, SeaView is a supernatural drama centred on urban, working class communities in the Midlands, due to premiere at the Belgrade on 10 November. Other recently announced highlights include the world premiere of This Little Relic by Karla Marie Sweet, a metaplay about producing Ira Aldridge's The Black Doctor, as part of the BBC's Contains Strong Language Festival, to be performed to a live audience on Fri 24 Sept and then broadcast on BBC Radio 3 at a later date. This Little Relic will then run in the Belgrade's B2 auditorium from Weds 29 Sept – Sat 2 Oct. Then running from Sat 26 Feb – Sat 5 March 2022, The Belgrade will present the world premiere of **Kerbs**, a debut play from Michael Southan exploring taboos around sex, romance and disability, in association with Graeae Theatre Company.

About Michael Southan

Michael Southan is a playwright and poet from Wolverhampton in the West Midlands. He is an alumni of Birmingham Repertory Theatre's Foundry development programme and was a member of BBC Writersroom's first Writers' Access Group in 2018. Michael's radio drama 'A Moment's Paws' was part of the Connections series nominated for a BBC Audio Drama Award in 2021.

About Shahid Iqbal Khan

Shahid Iqbal Khan's foray into creative writing began with a short play for Carol Godby's Festival of Plays (Met Theatre, Bury). He joined the Manchester Muslim Writers' group not long after, a collective that inspired him to explore and compose poetry.

He was Associate Artist for Phizzical Productions and is an alumni of Graeae Theatre's prestigious Write To Play programme.
